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# From the Desk of Russ Jones, President, Arizona He Alliance


Dear Arizona Heritage Alliance Members and Friends:

Together, over the past decade, we helped return the State Parks Heritage Fund to its rigl

benefit Arizona. With thousands of community allies and dozens of legislative champions, the State Parks Heritage Fund was put back into statute (2019), \$5 million was appropriated FY 21/22, another \$2.5 million was appropriated for FY22/23 and Governor Hobbs appropriated \$6 million for FY 2023/2024.



We are not done yet! The Alliance's Legislative Task
Force has reconvened and started meeting to develop a
strategy for the 56th 2<sup>nd</sup> Regular Legislative Session
opening in January 2024 to restore the ASP Heritage
Fund back in the lottery and fully-funded to its original
\$10 million each year as the voters intended it. As part
of the strategy, the Alliance will continue to work with the
Arizona State Public Lands Coalition, an influential group
of conservation advocates, who have helped implement
our 2023 public awareness campaign. In the meantime,

## The Arizona State Parks Heritage Fund Grant Porta Open

On June 30, 2023, Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs signed the state budget for Fiscal Year 2 including \$6 million to fund the Arizona State Parks Heritage Fund. Here's a summary of the State Parks Heritage Funds in the state budget. Click here for more detailed information and

• Available Funds: \$6 million

to apply.

- Eligible Applicants: Include non-profits, governmental entities: cities, towns, counties, tribal governments, state and federal agencies. Organizations and clubs may enter into a cooperative agreement with an eligible applicant, (e.g. forest land manager).
- Eligible Projects: The Heritage Fund provides grant opportunities for trail projects, outdoor environmental education programs, local, regional, and state parks, as well as historic preservation projects through legislatively appropriated fund.

## Local, Regional, and State Parks (LRSP)

- Funds Available: \$10,000 to \$500,000 per project
- Eligible Applicants: State, County, Local, Tribal
- Eligible Projects: LRSP projects address construction, maintenance and developmen outdoor recreation facilities

#### **Historic Preservation**

- Funds Available: \$5,000 to \$360,000 per project
- Eligible Applicants: State, Local, County, Tribal, Schools, Non-Profits
- Eligible Projects: Projects must directly involve the resources listed in the Arizona of Register of Historic Places or determined eligible for listing by the State Historic Presoffice

#### **Trails Program**

- Funds Available: Up to \$120,000 per project
- Eligible Applicants: State, County, Local, Tribal, Non-Profit
- Eligible Projects: The Trails Program provides funds to develop and maintain trails a facilities for non-motorized trail uses.

#### **Outdoor Environmental Education**

- Funds Available: Up to \$120,000 per project
- Eligible Applicants: State, Local, Schools, County, Tribal, Non-Profits
- Eligible Projects: Promote outdoor and environmental protection programs related to outdoor recreatio



#### Arizona's Nonprofit Arts & Culture Sector Generates \$1.1 Billion in Economic Act

it's a night at the opera in Phoenix or a day trip to Yuma for an arts festival, local economies get a big boost from Arizona's nonprofit arts and culture sector. How big? According to new data the state's nonprofit arts & culture sector generated a staggering \$1.1 billion in economic activity. Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6), a national economic and social impact study conducted by Americans for the Arts, comprises data collected in 373 study regions representing all 50 states and Puerto Rico. In Arizona, data collection was coordinated by regional partners in 9 regions: Chandler, Mesa, Flagstaff, Phoenix, Scottsdale, Sedona, Tempe, Pima County, and metro-Phoenix's West Valley. Additionally, the Arizona Commission on the Arts, an agency of the State of Arizona, directly partnered with 20 arts and culture organizations, most in towns outside Maricopa County and Pima County, to gather data from historically underrepresented communities. Past efforts to report on the economic and social impact of the nonprofit arts and



culture sector in Arizona have struggled to reflect the incredible depth and diversity of art activity throughout the state. To read the full report, link here.

### Arizona Humanities Mini Grants Cycle is Now Open. Arizona Humanities Mini Grants

grants of up to \$2,000 that are available year-round to support innovative public programs that increase understanding of the human experience. Applicants may request up to \$2,000 in Mini Grants per fiscal year (November 1 – October 31). Mini Grants can be used for

program. These grants are available to help preserve nationally significant historic properties and collections. Grants can be used for preservation and/or conservation work on historic districts, buildings, sites, and objects as well as collections, including artifacts, museum collections, documents, and works of art. The Save America's Treasures program was established in 1998 and since inception has awarded more than \$356 million in grants to over 1,320 projects across the country. Funded through the Historic Preservation Fund, SAT grants are divided in to two separate applications, one for preservation grants and one for projects involving collections. # First Round of 23/24 Arizona State Parks Heritage Grant Awards

The <u>Arizona State Parks & Trails</u> Board approved the FIRST round of the 2023/202 Heritage Fund grants at their September 21, 2023 Board meeting. Congratulations to receiptants in the 2024 Heritage Environmental Education Category.

**Distribution" Project. With a match of \$2,560.60 the total amount of the project is \$24,324.60.** The VVCC's Bike Patrol is the only local organization performing this service by handing out Bells to cyclists on the trails. The commonly accepted trail etiquette rules state that all trail users should share the trail in a courteous manner. The trail etiquette rules also indicate that there is a hierarchy relative to sharing the trail: hikers need to yield to equestrians, and mountain bikers need to yield to both equestrians and hikers. Because of the trail etiquette rules, and the fact that mountain bikers can come upon the other trail users rather quickly, it is necessary for bikers to alert other trail

users of their presence. However, when a rider is going fast and/or may not have a upcoming trail users a Bell is a very effective way for the biker to alert other trail users. consistent jingle that announces one's presence without having to manually strike the Bell is a very effective way for the biker to alert other trail users.

The Flagstaff Unified School District was awarded a \$42,652 for the Camp Colton

of \$35,925 the total amount of the project is \$76,577. This award will support forest health education at Camp Colton, an outdoor environmental education facility that serves students from Flagstaff and the surrounding rural areas. As a result of drought and fire suppression, area forests face unprecedented risk of wildfire, threatening homes as well as watersheds and natural resources. Camp Colton aims to connect middle school students with their natural world in a way that inspires them and teaches them to be responsible forest stewards. Flagstaff is one of the only communities in the country that has voted to invest in a city-scale watershed restoration effort (the Flagstaff

Flagstaff Trails Initiative was awarded a \$16,234 for the "Kiosk Trailhead Update"

**\$21,136.** FTI's project is two-fold, one is the need to update trailhead signs to show the existing trail route for each of the 14 kiosk areas. Doing this will help Grand Canyon Youth {GCY} provide up to 700 Arizona youth (10-19) with educational, affordable, outdoor experiences on the rivers and canyons of Arizona. GCY expeditions range from 1-day to multi-week expeditions on the rivers in Arizona. Youth participants engage with a curriculum customized for their group before and during their expedition

# The Arizona Game and Fish Heritage Partnership Pi

The <u>Arizona Game and Fish Heritage Partnership Program</u> (formerly known as the AGFD I

Fund) has been redesigned to provide opportunities to collaborate with eligible entities to fund projects that provide conservation and recreational benefits. Eligible entities include governmental agencies, Indian tribes, and non-governmental organizations (must meet the IRS definition of a 501c3).

- Concept proposals may be submitted at any time throughout the year and all funds are awarded externally.
- All projects must provide a conservation benefit and be eligible for Heritage funding, <u>17-296 – Definitions</u>



 Project must be completed within one (1) year, following the state fiscal year July 1 – June 30 of the following year.
 Projects spanning up to two (2) years may be considered based on biological windows and the scope of work.



• Project funding is provided on a reimbursement basis.

Each year the Arizona Game and Fish Commission approves a set amount of funding per Funding amounts provided may not exceed the amount approved by the Commission.

- Identification, Inventory, Acquisition, Protection and Management of Sensitive Habit IIAPM is for projects that preserve and enhance Arizona's natural biological diversity \$200,000 per fiscal year.
- Public Access Public Access is for projects that increase or maintain public access recreational use and is budgeted \$50,000 per fiscal year.
- Urban Wildlife and Urban Wildlife Habitat (URBAN) Urban is for projects that constand establish wildlife habitats and populations in harmony with urban environments budgeted \$130,000 per fiscal year.

## **Board Member Spotlight - Bonnie Bariola**

After working for 14 years in the Business Field as a Manager in the Data Processing Department, Bonnie returned to college at ASU receiving her Bachelor of Science Degree with a major in Urban Planning and Landscape Architecture in 1988. Her first position was Community Development Director for the Town of Florence. In this position she wrote several grants for streetscape projects. She was instrumental in helping create the design and implementation of the 27-acre Heritage Park which contains 3 ball

In 1990 when the Arizona Heritage Fund was established through a voter initiative, Bonnie began writing grants, utilizing the Heritage Fund to provide partial funding for the rehabilitation of many historic properties in Florence. While working as Sr. Planner for Pinal County from 1996 – 2004, she continued rehabilitating historic buildings in Florence. She was also the Staff Liaison working with personnel from the National Park Service,
